The Lady of the Snowdrops

It will be readily admitted, by all who know it, that Inverkip is a place of much natural beauty. at every season of the year, from the early spring to the late autumn, And even in the cold and dead days of winter, there is always some spectacle of beauty, on sea or land or hill, which the eye can behold with pleasure. But to most of the folks who live in it, the springtime with its lovely snowdrops, holds a special charm, and how lovely they are, always making their appearance in the early days of February. the shoot up out of the cold and bare ground and grow in such profusion as to seem like a veritable mantle of purest snow. They are an exquisite delight to all who see them.

Now the snowdrops did not come there by themselves. They are not native to the soil, like our woodland flowers, or the far-famed Scottish bluebell. somebody must have planted them, and I can give the name of the lady who did so. She was, first, lady Maxwell of Polloc. The days in which she lived were marked by a great desire on the part of landowners to beautify their grounds by the planting of bulbs. The result of lady Maxwell's efforts are to be seen in Polloc estate today., she had, however only been married a few years when Sir James Maxwell died, and she became the wife of Sir John Shaw Stewart of Ardgowan.

As mistress of Ardgowan She continued the work, begun at Polloc, only on a more extensive scale. the whole of the high banking around the old castle of Ardgowan, stretching for more than a mile, and other parts of the policies were planted with the tiny snowdrop bulbs. The work must have entailed much type and thought and labour.

A hundred and fifty, years have past since the planting was done, and, during that time, the snowdrops have increased greatly. They now grow in countless masses. coming suddenly, after the severe days of winter, and, clothed in their pure and modest raiment of white, they never fail to bring a message of hope and cheer to all who behold them. "*chaste snowdrop, sweet harbinger of spring and pensive monitor of fleeting years*"

PROPERTY GROUP



Hmmm! It was not a particularly great summer weather-wise, but that did not stop the weeds and the grass growing ferociously in the Church grounds. The Property Group kept everything under control, however, and the place is looking neat. They have also attended to several small repairs and are germinating ideas for future improvements to the estate. I

never know what the team are going to do next!

One priority that is definitely on the cards concerns roof repairs. A bat licence is first required, however, and to that end I am grateful to Cairn Ecology for conducting surveys on a voluntary basis. Seven years ago, such surveys revealed that our maternity roost of soprano pipistrelles numbered 800. It now looks as though that has swollen to more than a thousand! If you would like to see some for yourself, look at the south-west of the roof about half an hour before sunset - the bats flit out in ones, twos or even small groups. Better, watch them swarm en masse as they return to the roost just before sun-rise. Be quick, however, as the bats will shortly be departing for the winter.

Big thanks to all the team, past and present, for keeping the church and its buildings fit and healthy. Also, to members of the congregation who additionally contribute in their varied ways. There is a culture of anonymity but you all know who you are!

AT THE BIRD TABLE

Well, it doesn't feel like three months since I last put pen to paper to write my summer contribution (what a fib! I used the laptop and typed it) for the summer edition of the Inverkip Church Newsletter, and a cracking publication it was, as always! A grand read for the holidays.

You will have guessed by my evasive ramblings that I haven't got much to say on the birding front in this issue. As I said in

the last issue, summer is a quiet period, not for the birds, what with egg laying, feeding, more egg laying, more feeding, but for bird watching.

I spent a week up on the northeast coast in a small caravan site near Elgin, close to the shore with pine woods behind. It was the same location as last year and I had hoped to



see Crested Tits as they are only found in that corner of Scotland. No such luck (again) however!

Just before we travelled north television channels and newspapers showed images of the Bass Rock on the east coast of Scotland. The rock is home to the world's largest Gannet colony which had been decimated by Avian Flu. Dead and dying Gannets and other species of sea birds were being washed up all along the east coast. This disease can affect many species of wild birds and can also affect domestic fowl and pet birds.



During a walk along the shore, I spotted what I thought was a white plastic bag at the water's edge, but on getting closer I noticed movement as a yellow bill and white head slowly appeared. It was a Gannet, presumably suffering

from Avian Flu, and it simply turned its head to look at me but made no to attempt to move otherwise. A day or so later, on the beach with the family, I came across a Guillemot, standing upright but hunched up like a Penguin, and again, making no attempt to move away as I passed by.



The situation in Scotland is extremely serious and is having a massive impact on the wild bird population, especially seabirds, and may take many years before we see a marked recovery. Please remember not to touch dead or dying birds and keep dogs away from sick and dead birds. If you come across five or more dead birds, please report to the DEFRA helpline on 03459 33 55 77. Please be extra diligent when dealing with your feeders, clean and disinfect them regularly and be sure to wash hands thoroughly when finished.

Hopefully things are improving and we'll be able to enjoy the winter visitors and our usual garden birds as the year progresses.

On a lighter note – the Rowan trees are looking resplendent with massive crops of ripening red berries. It's amazing how quickly they disappear when the birds decide they're ready to eat. In absolutely no time at-all the fruit is devoured by hoards of Black Birds,

Thrushes and Wood Pigeons initially but, later in the season, if any berries remain, we might also see the occasional Redwing or Fieldfare.

Take care, keep safe, and enjoy your bird watching. **Dunnock**
