I was blessed to see the Aurora Borealis at the Lyle Hill Viewpoint in Greenock. What a sight to see the view we know so well but with the

beautiful and mysterious Northern Lights dancing in the sky and reflecting on the river. My dear daughter, with her knowledge of physics and photography, was trying her best to explain to me what

causes this phenomenon. I'm sad to say, I'm still not totally sure what she meant! However, the words I felt on my heart were 'Order from Chaos'. Perhaps that's a good theme for our journey through Lent? Choosing peacefulness, calmness and order in the midst of the drama that goes on all around us all the time. We can only hear God speak when we stop and listen. How healing it is to come into His presence and focus our minds on Him entirely.

A few weeks ago Sarah and I were blessed to meet with the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, the Rt Rev Dr Iain Greenshields. We had a lovely chat and he spoke very encouragingly about women in ministry roles and about needing more young people in the Church. I told him about my role here and the Café church and he sends his best wishes to you all. The Moderator spoke about Jesus calling the fishermen to put down their nets, stop what they were doing and listen to him. Their lives were about to completely change as they gave up their past, gave up what they were holding on to and instead followed Him. In The Old Testament we read about God calling Ezekiel to be a prophet: *"The sky opened and I saw a vision of God. There in Babylonia beside the Chebar River, I heard the Lord speak to me, and I felt His power. I looked up and saw a windstorm coming from the north. Lightening was flashing from a huge cloud, and the sky around it was glowing. Where the lightening was flashing, something shone like bronze" Ezekiel 1 (1 - 4)*

"Above the dome there was something that looked like a throne made of sapphire, and sitting on the throne was a figure that looked like a human being. The figure seemed to be shining like bronze in the middle of fire. It shone all over with a bright light that had in it all the colours of the rainbow. This was the dazzling light which shows the presence of the Lord. When I saw this, I fell face down on the ground. Then I heard a voice". Ezekiel 1 (26-28)

I pray that we earnestly seek God's peace this Lenten season and beyond.

The Church is hopefully getting the roof repairs completed before the end of March. The bats usually return at the start of April, so time is not on our side at present. The roofer has ordered the lead that is required and the scaffolding is planned to be put up very soon.

During December we also distributed over 50 goodie bags to elderly and housebound folks within our parish. A big thank you to the Sunday School for making beautiful tree decorations, to our loyal team of bakers who, every year, produce tasty treats for the bags and to the other volunteers who help make up and distribute the goodie bags.



TREASURER'S REPORT

The 2022 accounts have been examined by Robert J Henderson LLB CA from Henderson & Company. We thank him for all his work. As always, my thanks also go to the Finance Committee who have helped with the banking duties and gift aid claims and my nephew Jamie Glancy for helping me to prepare the accounts. He is my only hope of another accountant in the family.

I'm pleased to say that during 2022, Inverkip has had a good year financially. Excess of receipts over payments was £13,320, and there are adequate unrestricted cash funds of £68,338 available to meet ongoing requirements.

The main points that I'd like to draw your attention to are:

- Total receipts increased slightly compared to 2021 (excluding legacy received in 2021)
- The largest expense is Ministry and Mission allocation that is used by the Church of Scotland to fund ministry work both within Scotland and abroad. We will have to pay £16,526 in 2023 under the new Giving to Grow scheme which is slightly less than under old scheme
- We have been able to support many non-profit organisations such as, Christian Aid, Poppy Scotland, Inverclyde Foodbank, Starter Packs, Shelter Scotland (retiring offering from Christmas 2021/22), DEC Ukraine Appeal, CrossReach and Inverclyde Youth for Christ. We were also able to help a young person experiencing hardship after an accident and the Inverkip Bowling Club with a big event from the Crawford Bequest.

I hope that everyone enjoys reading the accounts in more detail. There are updates from all our organisations. If you have any questions then please let me know.

Radiate Youth Wellbeing Cafe

Radiate Youth Wellbeing Café will be a drop in café for young people in Inverclyde in the 11-18 age range. Poor Mental Health and Wellbeing is the most prominent issue facing young people today. Research statistics indicate that there has been an increase in



young people diagnosed with mental health related illness since the covid pandemic began. (The Children's Society) Around 3 young people in every classroom has a diagnosable mental health illness. This is why we believe that it is important to provide environments for young people which are safe, welcoming and give access to trusted adults who can sign post young people to support services. Motivated by our Christian faith, we have passion to see young people's lives transformed by Jesus. We believe that creating spaces where young people can talk to Christians and explore faith; and where they can be listened to, encouraged and built up can help young people reach their potential.

In addition to the money raised from the tearoom there will also be retiring offerings after each Communion service. June's will go to support this year's Guild Project and October's will be donated to Crossreach.

Our retiring offering for the Turkey/Syria earthquake appeal in February raised almost £200.

A big thanks to everyone for all your continued support of worthy causes.

Over at the Halls, they have created drainage channels in strategic positions and have


also continued painting the internal doors. This in addition to early spring cleaning.

Our next meeting will be on 27 March at 2 pm when the speaker will be David Rourke. A warm welcome to all.


For our last meeting on 24 April we are going for lunch at the Clyde Kitchen, which is where we had a lovely Christmas lunch.

TALES OF AULD KIRK AND ITS WITCHES By Rev William Crawford. MC

Continued from the previous issue:

The Lady of the Snowdrops

There is another reason why succeeding generations should remember this laird of Ardgowan. He had built a fine mansion. He had completed at great cost a fine road, and now he is to build a church for the folk and old Kirk. towards the end of the 18th century, the old church in the graveyard had gradually fallen into great disrepair six hundred years had now passed since it had first been built. The walls threatened at any moment to give way and support no longer the roof, which itself was leaking badly.

For some time, how long it is difficult to say, the people had gathered for worship outside the church us it was unsafe to go inside. the people sitting around on the gravestones. A new church had to be built do you replace the old and the people we are too poor to build it. When the road was finished, Sir John came to their rescue and said" I will build them a church." the stone was taken from the quarry at Langhouse and it was opened for worship in the year 1806. the church, standing today facing the public Rd, is just as Sir John built it. in the year 1908 Sir Hugh Shaw Stewart undertook all the expense of re seating it and sometime before he hurt himself become an elder of the church and member of Kirk Session.

Nearly a Century and a half Has gone by since Sir John Shaw Stewart said "I will build them a church". many changes have taken place since, but for many years to come men and women and little children will continue to gather themselves together within its walls to praise and worship God after the manner of their father's!

It is not surprising that the matters just related attracted a deal of attention. One of those who was greatly interested was John Galt. "One Sunday" he tells us. "happening to take a walk to the neighbouring village to Greenock, Inverkip I observed that, from the time I had been there, some progress had been made by Sir John Shaw Stewart in turning it inside out. While looking at the various improvements around, my intention of writing a ministers sedate adventures returned upon me. it was as if the mantle of inspiration had suddenly dropped upon my shoulders," Galt wrote shortly thereafter, the annals of the parish and laid the manuscript aside. some years passed before he took it up and re read it and was struck by its merits. He then send it to Blackwood, in Edinburgh and is publication greatly increased the already growing fame of its author.

It is supposed by some that the Annals of the Parish were the description of parish life in Inverkip. But it is not so, for Galt himself adds that "although the story was suggested by the improvements at Inverkip the scene was laid and the characters taken from individuals living in the whereabouts of the village of Dreghorn."

Speaking in praise of Sir John Shaw Stewart, a contemporary historian uses the following words: "he was a man remarkable for a powerful and enlarged understanding, for an independent mind, for the most generous spirit, and the most benevolent disposition. above all, for the most stern and inflexible integrity." Surely it is hardly possible to find words in which higher praise could be given.

Sir John and his wife lie buried together in the vault built over part of the ground on which the old Kirk stood. it is good that we should remember them. ECO GROUP

Over the past year there has been more of a return to normality after the worst of the restrictions during the covid pandemic have now eased..

The litter picking group, now named LitterKippers, has continued to meet once



a month to tackle the many litter issues which our community still faces- general littering around the village and beaches, fly tipping and marine litter washed up on the shoreline. Over the year, the group collected a total of 215 bin bags of litter from around our community, which doesn't include all the larger fly tipped items unable to be bagged. This is less than the previous year and is probably down to a couple of factors. The number of volunteers has dropped significantly, often there are only 7 or 8 regular people, but also a lot of the "historical" litter has now been cleared from around the community. Our picks have been bolstered by the Cubs, their leaders and parents of the 85th, who have helped out a couple of picks over the course of the year, and with more planned in the year to come. Our thanks go to all the volunteers who have turned out in all weathers to help to make a difference, and to staff from Inverclyde Council for the provision of litter picking equipment, bags and for the collection of the rubbish afterwards. The group continues to liaise with, support and be supported by the other litter picking groups in Inverclyde under the umbrella of

Our newspaper and magazine collection has continued throughout the year, and delivered regularly to White House Products in Port Glasgow, who shred them and use to package their products. A small donation is made per kilo, and over the past year, the accumulated total was 2029.5kg (over 2 metric tonnes!) with a donation of £202.95 which will be used to purchase litter picking equipment.

The church continues to have monthly collections for Inverclyde Foodbank

and Starter Packs Inverclyde. Empty medication packs can also be dropped off and these are then taken to a local collection point for recycling.

The past year has continued to be challenging to sell fair trade products with limited opportunities but the group continues to promote local fair trade events and global issues through social media. It is hoped that a monthly fair trade stall will be able to resume in the coming

months. The Eco group will also use this opportunity again to offer refills of eco friendly washing up liquid, previously popular with many members. Refills and many other eco and plastic free products can be purchased at local shop Invereco, in Greenock and members are encouraged to give this great wee business our support.

Following on from the success of the event the previous year at the beginning of Advent, the church hosted a Light evening outside the church where members of the community could come along and write a message to remember someone on a small wooden disc to hang on our Christmas tree outside the church. The tree was decorated with eco/bird friendly decorations, with baubles made of fat balls and garlands made of monkey nuts and cranberries.

Our thanks go to all those who continue to support our eco initiatives, and we look forward to being able to continue and develop

over the year to come.

AT THE BIRD TABLE

Writing this contribution for the magazine on a beautifully clear, but extremely cold, afternoon, I am somewhat apprehensive. Why? you may ask am I so downcast, well it's all the fault of the weather forecasters on the telly. Those cheery lads and lasses have announced that we are yet again about to be subjected to further chaos as super cold air from the north brings snow to almost the entire country. Yellow warnings cover most of the country, snow ploughs are ready to plough and gritters are ready to grit as soon as the first flake hits terra firma.

It's been no joke for many parts of the country so far this winter, especially the Highlands and the North, and up until now we have gotten off lightly in this part of the world. While we might bemoan the extremes of weather causing disruption the situations in eastern Europe due to war and earthquakes make our circumstances pale into insignificance by comparison. We do really need to count our blessings!

The weather, on top of Avian flu, seems to have taken a toll on birdlife this winter and while the feeders in the garden were busy certain species seemed to be in short supply e.g. Greenfinch, Long-tailed Tit, Siskin, and Song Thrush. This winter I haven't seen or heard of any local sightings of winter migrants such as Waxwings. Perhaps the appearance of Sparrowhawks in the area have contributed to the lack of visitors. It was interesting to hear that Bullfinches, not usually seen in built up areas, have been seen in a few local gardens.

Squirrels are plentiful and seem to enjoy the suet balls in the "squirrel proof" cage feeder. They are incredible acrobats and contortionists.



Two other recent garden visitors, on separate occasions, were Roe deer, a Buck and a Doe. Although the images were taken almost a fortnight apart both deer were photographed at the same spot. The Buck was later filmed in a garden close to Langhouse Road and the householder was able to capture, on video, the rascal eating tender shoots in the flower beds. Very frustrating for a gardener but a reassurance that we still have a few Roe Deer in the area.





Now would be a good time to get your nest boxes cleaned out and repaired if necessary and it would also be appropriate to site any new boxes to allow prospective occupants to become accustomed to their presence around the garden.

If you are a DIY enthusiast, then check out the RSPB website for details of the traditional style of boxes (for several species) to make at home. As usual keep feeders going and be sure to provide water.

Keep safe and enjoy your birdwatching.
