


<u>Friday, 2 December – Prostrate Cancer</u> <u>Fundraiser – 7pm for 7.30pm at Inverkip</u> Church Hall

TALES OF AULD KIRK AND ITS WITCHES

Continued from the previous issue:

The Lady of the Snowdrops

I have not yet told all that this good lady did. the country was at war, and Napoleon threatened to invade the land with his armies. many had gone forth to fight and left widows to mourn them. food was both scarce and dear, there was much distress and poverty in the land studies have come down to us of the lady of the snowdrops being foremast in deeds of benevolence, she organised help for the sufferers, visited the widows in their affliction. Out of her substance she closed the naked and cared for the poor.

The man whom she married, the 4th baronet, was the first to bear the name of Shaw Stewart," Appointment the death of his grand uncle Sir John Shaw, 3rd baronet of Greenock, in 1752, he inherited the entailed estates of Greenock Easter, Greenock and Finnart And assumed the additional name of Shaw. through his mother he came also to represent the families of Nicholson of Carnock and Houston of that ilk."

Sir John Shaw Stewart, seems, in every sense, to have been a remarkable man. Distinguished by many great qualities, a man of great energy, vision and faith, he stood out from among his contemporaries As Saul stood out from the rest of the people. He succeeded to the baronetcy in the year 1796. His father lived till he was 84 and Sir John-The eldest son-was then a man past middle age. he died in 1812. he was Laird of Ardgowan for 16 years; but into those years was crowded a record of achievement which sounds to us today almost incredible.

In the first place he applied all his energy into building a new residence, the family had left for two centuries and more in some buildings lying close to the old castle, they were small and must have been lacking in both space and comfort, it was in no sense, a fitting or were they residents for the family, in two years' time, Sir John had the plans by Cairncross submitted, and the new mansion of go and completed I'm ready for occupation in 1798.

Ardgowan House, as it was called, with this fine hall and staircase, It's spacious rooms unsplendid outlook was regarded from the moment it was built as one of the finest residences in the County of Renfrewshire. Do it there was added, some years later a beautiful Chapel what it's lovely organ which was in constant use until quite recent times. as the years passed, the house contained more and more treasures-chiefest of which are perhaps the fine landscapes and paintings by well-known masters which adorn its walls. the most romantic is a portrait of himself which Napoleon had painted for his mother by a famous French artist. Below, in a little receptacle, is a lock of the great Emperors hair, and accompanying it is a field marshals 3 cornered hat. it has a bullet hole through it. Napoleon wore it at the Battle of Wagram!

Sir John next sets his heart on a greater undertaking. roads well the great lack in Scotland then, and the only road to Greenock from Inverkip was by the old graveyard, across the Roman bridge, advance by what was no more than a cat track winding up and down the valley of the Kip it was a day's journey in itself. Sir John Shaw Stewart determined that he would make a better and more direct road.

The project that faced him was formidable enough; the sea at high tide, wash the stones at the foot of the bell rock. believe it or not, there is a picture, on the walls of outgoing house, depicting fishing boats sailing up two within a short distance of Bankfoot. The Kip emptied itself there into the waters of the Firth!

Before the road could begin, the Kip, which at times came down in a turbulent flood, had to be diverted and the new course made for it, That course follows at the present day. Much solid masonry was used in the process. the road, it was more than a road-the broad highway took three years to construct and involved an immense amount of labour. As it proceeded it compassed the ruin of the house at Cresswell and so brought to fulfilment the curse that the prophet, Peden, had lead upon it. Sir John bore the whole expense of the great undertaking.

The road was completed in the year 1802-1803. Greenock then showed little signs of the vast expansion that was to take place during the 19th century. The genius of James Watt, the advent of the Steamboat and the great era of industrialism were yet to come. From a small borough of a few thousand inhabitants good Greenock was to become an important seaport of some 60,000 people by the end of the century. With its key position on the Clyde, it's great shipyards, docks and factories it was rapidly to develop into one of the busiest centres of trade in the whole country. Sir John Shaw Stewart must have had some vision of the great days ahead when he planned the road which will ever be associated with his name.

AT THE BIRD TABLE

Judging by the gales and the rainfall during the last couple of weeks of October and the beginning of November, coupled with turning the clocks back, I would have to say that Winter is upon us. Summed up well but that little known poet, Billy Shakespeare, who said, "When icicles hang by the wall, And Dick the shepherd blows his nail And Tom bears logs into the hall, And milk comes frozen home in pail, When blood is nipp'd and ways be foul, Then nightly sings the staring owl, Tu-whit; Tu-who, a merry note."

It's been a while since I've heard owls hooting around the village but there again, I don't tend to be out and about so much when darkness falls. In the past I have heard Tawny Owls calling from trees within the village and I know that there are still Barn Owls hunting silently along hedges and fields. It can be a bit un-nerving when a Barn Owl, with its soundless flight, suddenly appears out of the blue (or should that be "the black"?) on a still, misty night. Really spooky!

Trees are shedding their leaves quite rapidly now and, on returning from a week of dog sitting in Aberdeenshire, we were surprised to see that all the rowan berries had been stripped from the trees. Presumably the birds, for there was not a trace of berries on the ground, had been feasting in our absence. With the berries and leaves gone I get a good view of birds (and squirrels) waiting in the tree to get to the feeders.



We decided to take an indirect route to Aberdeenshire with a couple of overnight stops to visit places of interest. Our first destination was Birnam on the A9 to visit The Hermitage, a scenic woodland glen with waterfalls and gorges, originally designed in the 18th. Century for the Dukes of Atholl as a pleasure ground. We followed winding paths up the glen to the famous Rumbling Bridge, a really spectacular spot.

Next morning, we stopped off at Loch of the Lowes, a Scottish Wildlife Trust reserve in Perthshire. It has a visitor centre with toilets and a shop, there are also two observation hides complete with telescopes, at the shore of the loch. The loch is fished by a pair of Ospreys between April and August and in winter wildfowl such as Goldeneye, Wigeon and Whooper swans may be seen. While at the centre we were able to watch a small group of Fallow Deer moving along the lochside. A lovey area and certainly worth a visit.

Scotland is a really wonderful country and it's certainly worth the effort to care for and protect our precious environment!
Although the regulations regarding "Bird Flu" have been relaxed please take care when dealing with your feeders, clean and disinfect them regularly and be sure to wash hands thoroughly when finished.
