#### Settling into the Spanish Culture

As most of you know I am studying French and Spanish at the University of Strathclyde, and I am currently in my 4<sup>th</sup> year. This year is a compulsory year abroad since I am a languages student and I decided to come to Spain to teach English in two schools rather than studying in a Spanish university. I have been placed in the city of Pamplona, which is the capital of the Navarre region, it is a relatively small city but famous for the San Fermín festival, known as the running of the bulls in English.

Can you believe I have been in Spain for nearly two months now? How time really does fly when you're having fun! I am so blessed to have been given this opportunity to live and work in such a wonderful country for nine months.



Not long after I arrived here, I managed to find a small Anglican Church which I have been welcomed into. The congregation is much smaller than back home in Inverkip, every Sunday there is only around two or three people in the congregation and the minister. It's not a usual church building, it's essentially a hall and the minister plays his guitar for the hymns. The service in entirely in Spanish and everyone else who attends are native Spanish speakers so it's a great

opportunity for me to improve my

Spanish language. When my Dad came to visit me we went to church together and sang a duet of "To God be the glory" which was a nice surprise for the congregation. Right beside the church is the most famous churros shop in Pamplona, it's only open on Sundays in October and during San Fermines, therefore during October we frequently had churros before the service, but they don't compare to Jim's bacon rolls on Easter morning!



I am really looking forward to seeing how the Spanish celebrate Advent and experiencing it in another country for the first time. I'm sure there will be many similarities to how we prepare for the arrival of Jesus in Scotland, but it will be interesting to see how another culture prepares. In saying that, I will be back in Scotland for Christmas and hopefully I'll get to see the Sunday School perform the Nativity which I'm thoroughly looking forward to before heading back to Spain for the three Kings celebrations. ¡Hasta luego!

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

The church accounts were approved by Presbytery and submitted to OSCR in October. Doesn't seem like that long since we did 2022 but we will be starting 2023 soon!



The church's revenue is still doing well compared to 2022. We received a further £4.1k from the consolidated fabric fund although this may be last claim for a while as the manse does not have tenants anymore. We received a donation of £5k for church building maintenance. I'm sure Susie and the property group will put this to good use soon! And a further donation from the badminton club in October which is much appreciated. We are planning to prepare a gift aid claim early December which should end the year nicely (last year we claimed £8.8k). We also collected £304.42 for Inverclyde Foodbank in October and £432.38 for Poppy Scotland in November.

The church's payments are similar to last year. Our biggest expense since last newsletter (excluding recurring ones like Ministry & Mission allocation) was for our CCLI coverage. This is our music licences.

Thanks again to you all for supporting the church's financially and making my job easy.



#### KATE, LILA & ARDGOWAN



TWO close friends who met while living and working on Ardgowan Estate in the 1950s say they look forward to seeing it become 'a hub of activity' again as the new distillery project progresses.

Lila McKnight, 83, and Kate MacPhail, 81, were recently invited back to Bankfoot for a tour of the site.

Kate first arrived at the estate in 1958 when her father secured a job as a butler. Her mother was then asked to take over the cooking at the site, with Kate eventually taking up a similar role. She went on to marry husband Jim – a joiner who worked in the estate's sawmill - at Ardgowan House.

Lila and her husband John, who served as head tractor man, came to live at Bankfoot in 1959. Having stayed there for another 58 years, she admits she was nervous about the plans for the distillery initially.

Lila said: "At the beginning, I was a bit apprehensive but now, when we see the work getting done, we wish everybody the best."

"We hope that it's a success."It's nice to see the change and to see things getting done."

Kate added: "It's quite nice to see the joiner's shops being retained – it's now where the gin still is. "That was the sawmill and the joiner's shop was up the stairs."

Despite not being whisky or gin fans themselves, the pair agreed their late husbands would be delighted to see the work being done at the estate. They also hope the new distillery will help draw visitors and whisky enthusiasts to Inverclyde.

Kate said: "For somebody that doesn't drink whisky, I counted it up and I have been at just about every distillery from Orkney right down through Caithness, Sutherland, and Inverness-shire. "My husband enjoyed it – he got my share of the drink as well. "Jim would've thoroughly enjoyed this, and so would John.

"In spirit they'll be here toasting it."

Ardgowan Distillery recently awarded a £7million contract to Muir Construction for the initial phase of the distillery building. This phase is expected to last around 12 months and will see the completion of the main production elements.

It is hoped the site will then be able to produce spirits from 2024.

## **Remembrance Day - 12 November 2023**











#### TALES OF AULD KIRK AND ITS WITCHES

#### **The Good Old Days**

We are all familiar with the phrase. To the younger generations the words convey little meaning. In the mains of those who can look back forty years and more, the call up of vision of peace and plenty, shops crowded with everything one could desire and at what seems to us now, such fabulously low prices. Happy days they were, indeed, carefree, with no cloud to overshadow them. These days seem far away now; and alas they are likely never to return.

A hundred Years ago, when Victoria had been Queen for ten years, Scotland was already sharing in a great wave of prosperity which continued to increase till it was Rudley shattered by the outbreak of the first World War in 1914.

The old days, with which I am concerned now, we're not 100 but 200 years ago. Days when the old church still stood in the graveyard and folk came to worship in it from beyond the moors, across the Roman bridge and up from the village of Daff. How did the people of the village live then? What where their social surroundings like? Where the better off than we are today with all our boasted advantages? Were these good old days.

Scotland, at the beginning of the 18th century, was a land of poverty. From 1697 to 1704 there had been a succession of disastrous harvests. The summers we're cold and wet; and the winters had come soon. The snow was falling as the grain was ripening; and the sodden stooks where left to rot in the fields.

The winters we are so severe, the cold so intense, that cattle, sheep and poultry died wholesale and countless birds perished. The people, when the crops failed, we're compelled to mix what grain they had with roots and herbs. When the meal was exhausted, they killed the cattle that were left, eating the flesh without bread. Near the coast many managed to sustain a spark of life and their bodies only by eating whelks and limpets varied by a diet composed of nettles and snails.

In the counties of Renfrewshire and Ayrshire, we are told, bodies were frequently to be found under high thorn hedges. The victims of hunger and cold; and the dead became so numerous that the living could hardly be found to bury them.

One can easily imagine the effect of these hungry years on the stamina of the people and the health of the children. The scarcity of food was felt most in the Highlands. For long months of the winter people were marooned by deep snow in the straths and Glens. It was the usual thing then for a family to number 10 and sometimes 15 children. Adam Smith, and his wealth of nations, states" it is not uncommon, I have frequently been told, in the Highlands for a mother to have 20 children and not to have one alive!"

Scotland remained a poor country for most of the 18th century. In the year 1773, the great doctor Johnston made a tour of the Hebrides. The impressions that the tour left upon him where the bareness of the countryside, hardly a tree was to be seen; under great poverty existing among the people. When he came to publish his dictionary shortly afterwards, he gave his definition of the word Oats," a food given in England to feed horses but, in Scotland supports the people!"

The chief reason for these distressing conditions is to be found in the primitive agricultural methods still in vogue. The custom of using oxen and only scratching the soil was prevalent. Drainage of the land was rarely attempted. The land itself was held on the precarious system of yearly tenure. The seed sown was over very poor quality; and even in a good year, only returned a bare three instead of thirty-fold. So that there was, according to the common saying," ane to gnaw and ane to saw and ane to pay the Laird withaw."

As a direct consequence many poor people were driven to support themselves by begging. Some years the number of beggars was very large indeed. Fletcher of Saltoun rates in the year 1698:" There are, at this day, 200,000 people begging from door to door living without regard to the law of the land or even the commandments of God."

Taking the words of this usually accurate observer as no wild exaggeration, it may be computed roughly that of Scotland's population of a million people, nearly a quarter were compelled to support themselves by begging." They went from door to door in one continuous stream," writes one," visiting alike the House of the Laird and the home of the peasant, holding out their meal- pokes and seldom were they turned away, for none refused to put into the wallet a handful of meal or barley.
