


BOOK BASKET

Sunday 19th of May was both Pentecost (50 days after Easter) and our Christian Aid united service and soup brunch in Skelmorlie.

This year's Christian Aid theme was 'Seven days for lasting change' and a short video shown during the service highlighted how transformative a small co-operative loan can be in Africa. Christian Aid offers advice and trains local people to establish their own savings and loan co-operatives. The case study showed how enabling the purchase of a simple bicycle increased the quantity of farm produce gathered in and sent on to the market by a widow called Aline. This in turn generates more revenue to help Aline pay for the further education of her children: a Christian action pushing back against the inhumanity of poverty. Our Outreach committee had prepared three tasty soups and hot rolls to be served with the usual refreshments after the service. It was both a time of fellowship and a celebration of the transformative power of the holy spirit. In May. ISWB Church of Scotland raised £1,080.00 for Christian Aid. Many thanks to all who helped out and donated to this worthy cause.









It kicked off with a guiz in Inverkip Bowling Club on Friday 7th June which was won by our own Jac Seggie's team. By Saturday lunchtime, in spite of the occasional showers, Inverkip Hub was buzzing with activities and entertainment indoors and out for all ages. 

We then started to look at his role as leader of the early church in Acts. respect and trust in each other develop, and their confidence in sharing feelings and details that were personal but relevant to the discussions. Of course, anything said stays confidential within the group, but it is one of the best ways to develop as a Christian. My experience over the vears has been that once someone takes the courage to come to a Bible study, they get involved, getting a better grasp of the Bible story and also of their faith journey. Perhaps there's a part of the Bible you have puzzled over or never looked at, or you would like a refresher on familiar stories. I haven't decided yet what we are going to study when we start again in the autumn, so please contact me with any suggestions you might have. Bible study so don't assume your topic might be off limits. Hopefully, I'll see you in the autumn.

GUIDING SKILLS FOR WELCOMING THE DEAF BLIND

Firstly, look out for a red band at the top of a white stick, which indicates hearing loss, in addition to visual hand, then drawing 'Hello' onto their skin; letter by letter, in block letters. You can introduce yourself too in this manner.

Guide the person by offering one of your elbows for them to hold in the cup of their hand. This is known as the 'C' grip. It means the person with the visual impairment can let go at any time and gives them full control of their progress.

Advance slowly ahead of the person with visual impairment. If the space narrows ahead, draw your guiding elbow back behind your back to communicate this change of dimension to them.

On reaching steps, take the hand of the visually impaired person from your elbow and place it on the stair bannister. Please do not hold their hand, count steps out or hurry them along.

Ensure the deaf blind person is guided to the same seat each week for worship, so they can build up a mental map of their Church environment.

Should a fire evacuation occur during a service, draw a large 'X' on their back with your fingers and offer your elbow for them to take in the 'C' grip, and guide them towards the emergency exit.

Two of our Outreach Team members attended an introductory online training session on the 25th of May hosted by Deafblind Scotland and experienced video simulations of sight impairments and learnt basic guiding skills for welcoming people with impaired vision and hearing loss. It was thought a good idea by our Church Outreach Group to communicate these tips more widely.


When guiding someone to a chair and table for fellowship, place the visually impaired person's hand firstly on the chair seat, then seat arms and lastly the table itself. This enables them to build a mental image of the relative heights of their surroundings before they sit down. Place any mugs containing hot drinks in a box before them

If visiting the deaf or blind person in their own home, please do not tidy or move objects from their setting. This will only disrupt their sense of place and their sixth sense which they have in their home environment and will cause them distress as they search for objects you have moved. A visit to an unfamiliar place will be mentally draining for the visually impaired and they will tire quickly.

ECO GROUP

The springtime continued to be busy for the Eco group who organised litter picks as part of the wider Big Clyde Beach Clean across Inverclyde, an initiative spawned by Keep Scotland Beautiful's Big Spring Clean.



This campaign saw litter picking groups coordinated by Green Tangerine, targeting the shoreline from Parklea right down to Wemyss Bay.

We were delighted that the Cubs and Beavers of the 85th Scout Group were able to assist with our beach clean and there was a great turn out from the children, leaders and parents.

Over the 6 week campaign there were 65 bags of litter collected from the beaches and around the village, 28 of which were sorted for recycling.

The statistics for the wider campaign across Inverclyde were incredible, with 628 volunteers taking part over 38 events, collecting 535 bags of litter equating to 2,675kg!

Well done to everyone involved! Our thanks go again to the staff from Inverclyde Council for the provision of litter picking equipment, bags and for the collection of the rubbish afterwards.

There is song by Andy Williams which starts "Where do I begin to tell the story" from the film "Love Story" and it has absolutely nothing to do with birdwatching or anything remotely connected with my article in this newsletter. Those first few words however seemed to mirror my thoughts before hitting the keys of the computer with my musings (or should that be ravings?) for my first "At The Birdtable" article in the new magazine.

In birding terms I'm not a "Twitcher", I just enjoy watching birds and other wildlife (insects, squirrels and occasionally Roe Deer) coming into the garden or seeing the variety of birdlife along the shore or in the local woodland. Without binoculars, and from the comfort of your own living room, it's amazing what you might see.

In early June I heard a Woodpecker a Cuckoo a few times in the nearby woods but didn't manage to spot either of them. They both tend to be quite elusive but it's good to know they are around.

Following a recent trip to Tiree I'm pleased to say I saw no evidence of dead or dying seabirds, victims of bird flu, on the beaches we visited. Hopefully the situation is now improving throughout the country but caution is still required.

We are blessed and privileged to live in a country where clean, uncontaminated water flows from our taps, most of the time.

But back in 1995 there was a severe crisis in West Yorkshire when the area ran dry due to a number of reasons, however, thousands of tankers drove the streets day and night for weeks, distributing supplies from other districts, ensuring we still had clean uncontaminated water to drink.

Welcome to Nairobi and its sprawling slum of Kibera - unlike West Yorkshire in 1995 - there is no lack of water - only a lack of clean, uncontaminated water.

The cause of the problem - damaged pipes, lack of investment and a 'broken system.'Contaminated water and poor sanitation are linked to the transmission of diseases such as cholera, diarrhoea. dysentery, hepatitis A, typhoid and polio. Absent, inadequate, or inappropriately managed water and sanitation services expose individuals to preventable health risks. Vision Ministries had to do

something - people were dying, at best missing work / school due to health issues. The effect on families was

devastating as incomes dropped with parents unable to feed their families or pay for medical care.

The government investing in fixing the 'system' would be the ideal solution but..... unfortunately for the majority nothing has changed.

When Vision Ministries heard about a local product - Water Guard - which treats contaminated water making it fit to drink, we decided to set up a program to distribute the product - freely through the local church.

We were blessed when Skelmorlie and Wemyss Bay Church came alongside with the brainstorming idea of the Smartie Challenge - filling a Smartie tube (once the contents had been enjoyed)
