# Have you ever walked a LABYRINTH?

Labyrinths have long been used for group rituals, private meditation, and contemplation. Some date back over 4,000 years. Unlike mazes, which can be disorienting, labyrinths guide you along a clear path, encouraging a slow and meaningful journey.

Historically, walking a labyrinth has been seen as a pilgrimage, a journey through life, or a path to enlightenment, offering opportunities for personal and spiritual transformation.

The spiral, an ancient symbol of unity and wellbeing, combines with the labyrinth's path to create a purposeful journey. As you walk, you might reflect, receive guidance, or release emotions. The twists and turns mirror life's ebb and flow, offering a meditative space.

In Inverciyde, five stunning labyrinths have been created to commemorate those lost during the pandemic. Funded by the Scottish Government via Greenspace Scotland and designed by RigArts, local artists, Alan Potter and Walk as One, a group of volunteers from across Inverciyde.

These labyrinths are located in:-

The Labyrinth of Love Wellpark, Greenock

The Labyrinth of Hope Coronation Park, Port Glasgow

The Labyrinth of Courage
Wemyss Bay Community Centre

The Labyrinth of Peace
Birkmyre Park, Kilmacolm

The Labyrinth of Joy

Darroch Park, Gourock

Each labyrinth is associated with a different sentiment — love, hope, courage, peace, and joy — reflected in the flower mosaics at their centres.

Each Labyrinth is site specific, unique and connected in providing spaces for reflection. Their names represent feelings, virtues and aspirations in response to the pandemic.



Readers will recall from the summer bulletin that the manse at Skelmorlie is to be retained for the new minister, and the manse at Inverkip is to be sold.



The grounds in our two church locations have been maintained throughout the (largely wet and cool) summer. A tree surgeon was engaged to remove the fallen tree in the south garden at Skelmorlie and quotes obtained to clear the scrub that has grown behind the east (cliff) wall of the church - thus, hopefully, reducing the need for constant leaf-clearing which is necessary to obviate blocked gutters and drains. In the front garden at Inverkip, a trellis and climbing sweet peas have enhanced the war memorial garden seat.

Work will start to fit the new kitchen & flooring in Inverkip Church Hall on 10th SEPTEMBER. The Kitchen will be out of use until the end of the month, sorry for the inconvenience but it will be well worth it.



And at SWB church the perforated lead above the chancel and upper hall will shortly be renewed. replacement of the eroded stonework surrounding a stained window is being costed, as are new ladders to provide access to the bell tower. The outcome of these developments and works in progress will feature in the next bulletin.

My sincere thanks are due to members of the Property Group and those who help them. Their time, talents and hard work are much appreciated. A warm invitation is, as always, extended to anyone wishing to join us.


It is not often that you have the Moderator of the Church of Scotland not only visiting your church but also conducting a baptism.

However, now we are back into term time we have began learning about some stories from the Old Testament such as


Daniel and the Lions and by the end of the service we had some great artwork!

### SCRIPTURE CAKE
