OBITUARY REV. BILL ARMSTRONG

17th July1942 - 17th February 2025



On 17th July Bill would have been 83 and some years ago Bill wrote "what do you want for your birthday, Grandpa? The question has echoed round our home for weeks. My answer is that I don't want anything, though the answer is not accepted."

"In that sense I have no need for anything. I have a thoughtful family around me; I have good friends who visit me from time to time; I have good Christian people who keep in touch, and pray for my well being; and I have healthcare professionals who see me on a regular basis. What more do I need?"Bill would be the first to agree, that he was never any good at putting on airs and graces, although worship always came from his heart.

Sometimes folk would be a little startled when his comments seemed rather 'non ministerial' by traditional standards, but this endeared him to many. Part of the reason could be that inside Bill Armstrong there lurked an engineer from Galloway stock. For 8 years he worked with Ferranti in Edinburgh followed by 4 with Marconi in Dunfermline before the call to full time ministry.

After a BD from Trinity College, Edinburgh, and some practical training, he came to West Kilbride as a Probationer. It was there that a Vacancy Committee from Skelmorlie and Wemyss Bay Parish found him, just down the road, after searching the length and breadth of the land. He was ordained and inducted on 16 May 1979 and the start of a very successful ministry and the rest is history.

In the last few years Bill showed immense determination and resilience as he fought a battle he was determined to win. He will be sadly missed by all who knew him and in particular by the community that he served for nearly thirty years.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

We continue to meet at Inverkip during our 10am service. We have two new members – one who has moved up from creche and one who has recently moved here from Aberdeen. We now have a Whatsapp Group for helpers and parents which is proving useful! If you require to be included please let Abigail know.

At the start of the year we looked at Epiphany, Jesus's Baptism and Spiritual Gifts - and the difference between those and other skills we have.

We also covered the story of Jesus in the Temple when He was aged 12 and His parents looking for Him everywhere. There was so much in the reading that we used the topic over two Sundays. Everyone agreed that Jesus was right to go to the place of worship as that is God's house and He would feel at home there.

We made collages of a church building with lots of people coming into it, then the children looked all over the halls for a picture of Jesus to add Him to the collage. We gave each child a different memory verse from the Old or New Testament which we added to their collage related to the broad theme: Each person has to seek and find Christ for themself and it's important to come to church and be in God's presence. We are looking forward to starting to use 'Spill The Beans' material and welcoming new helpers Jac and Morag.


By late November 2024, the Church of Scotland's stamp appeal, w i th

ORIGINS OF LENT

I am writing this article, partly to satisfy my own curiosity but also to give you an understanding of this significant period in the church liturgical calendar. I had always been fairly certain it didn't have a Biblical basis, but that was about it. However, a little research on some reliable websites has shown me that it is first mentioned in literature from the year AD 325, so the apostles and early church did not observe Lent. it became a tradition in the fourth century. Interestingly, such a date would place the ratification of Lent in the same year as and possibly at the Council of Nicaea, which was the major historical church council that affirmed the deity of Christ.

Positions and understandings have changed over the centuries, and church traditions throughout the world have developed different interpretations of Lent, some being very specific and necessary, whereas others do not celebrate it at all. The Directory for Public Worship, approved by the Scottish Parliament in 1645, takes the position that "There is no day commanded in scripture to be kept holy under the gospel but the Lord's day, which is the Christian Sabbath." Along with other Reformed Churches, the Church of Scotland has historically not observed Lent. John Calvin went as far as to call it a "superstitious observance"! We will leave it as

different churches do different things – much less controversial.

The period of Lent, between Ash Wednesday and Easter is 40 days (excluding Sundays). It is a time of holiness, when Christians remember the sacrifice of Christ and explore their own continuing process of sanctification, or becoming more Christ-like. Many choose to observe Lent with fasting and prayer. Fasting is simply abstaining from something to focus on something else. When we give up something, such as food, social media, or TV, we are given time to reflect on our faith and develop our relationship with God. For many though, it is just a demonstration of will-power.

However, it can be our way today of honouring and modelling the clear significance of 40 days and nights in the Bible, and specifically the time Jesus spent fasting and enduring temptation in the desert. As we sacrifice something we often turn to, we remember the sacrifice of Jesus Christ. We can connect with Jesus during his temptation, come to the realization of our need for forgiveness, and experience freedom from sin through his death and resurrection.

Our formal opportunities will be a series of short services during Holy Week, the week running up to Easter,

Here's a poem which I'm sure many of you may remember.

The North wind doth blow and we shall have snow, And what will poor robin do then, poor thing? He'll sit in a barn and keep himself warm and hide his head under his wing, poor thing.

Well, we've certainly had wind and rain in abundance this winter and I can only hope that we have a pleasant Spring and Summer. As I write, the weather has calmed down and although it has been very cold thankfully, we've had no significant snowfalls. (Note to self – don't push your luck!) What did I just say? Hailstones, accompanied by thunder, are now pelting down!

I haven't heard of any sightings of large flocks of birds migrating from Europe to the west coast but I was delighted to see a Redpoll (partial migrant and winter visitor) and a day later, an Arctic Redpoll on the feeders in the garden. Apparently, the Arctic variety often join flocks of Redpolls moving southwards in the winter months. A third visitor to the garden that same week was a solitary Siskin, a resident but usually in a small gang when in the garden. Another few weeks and the winter visitors will be gone and the summer residents will start to return.

Robins, Goldfinches, Chaffinches, Sparrows and Dunnocks are back in healthy numbers here in the garden although Long Tailed Tits seem to be scarce. I am however concerned that the loss and damage of vast numbers of trees during the recent storms may have a devastating effect on bird and mammal numbers through loss of habitats, nest sites, etc. Time will tell..

Lynne McBain contacted me to tell me of her sighting of a Kestrel hunting locally and had managed to capture it on video with her mobile phone. Nice film Lynne!

Remember, keep your feeders and water dishes clean and topped up.


SURPRISE FIND

On preparing the manse for our minister's arrival, three metal storage boxes were discovered behind an under-stair access hatch.

The storage boxes contained church correspondence and building plans from 1856 to 1975. Closer inspection revealed a design for our carved pulpit in the Skelmorlie and Wemyss Bay church building.


The Hunterian staff of Glasgow University inspected this original design on tracing paper and stated in all likelihood, that it could be attributed to Charles Rennie Mackintosh. There was Mackintosh style text on the drawing and it was found amongst dated correspondence for the new 'south church' which was designed and overseen by Honeyman and Keppie, the prominent Glasgow architects.

John Honeyman and his wife lived in Skelmorlie village at Stroove, on Montgomerie Terrace from 1868-1881. The aging John gave the young Mackintosh



design opportunities during the commission, most notably with the standard lamp to the left of the church steps.

The original pulpit drawing has been gifted by our Church to the Charles Rennie Mackintosh Society's ecclesiastical archive at their Queen's Cross Church international headquarters in Glasgow. A framed print of the pulpit drawing now hangs in the manse.

The Property Group had no sooner finished organising the repair of a leak in the Inverkip manse roof and rehabilitating the ceiling of the room below when Storm Éowyn upended a tree that grazed the garage roof as it fell.

Fortunately, the damage was minimal and will shortly be fixed. Many thanks are due to Fraser and David Martin for cutting the tree into manageable pieces and removing much of it. Storm damage was additionally inflicted upon the Inverkip Halls roof. Tiles were ripped off at the back and some woodwork at the eastern gable end. An insurance claim has been submitted, and we await the outcome in hopeful anticipation.

Meanwhile, at Skelmorlie Wemyss Bay some tiles were dislodged from the sanctuary roof and the external noticeboard was ruined. The latter is to be renewed (and its counterpart at Inverkip will be updated).

The Randalls have settled into the Skelmorlie Manse, with a few finishing touches being completed. The Inverkip Manse has at last been put on the market-let us hope that it sells quickly!

Property Group members have been tackling overgrowth in the grounds of both sites. Ivy and rhododendron were



cleared from along the cliff side of SWB, and at Inverkip the area behind the Halls has been strimmed.

Additional tasks include scraping and painting the ceiling above the "Beggars' Pew" at Inverkip and repasting some loose wallpaper in the sanctuary; cleaning mould from the stage in the Crawford Hall. Also, fitting a humidistat in the vestry at Skelmorlie Wemyss Bay and updating the honours board which lists past Ministers. The dishwashers at both sites have been repaired.

The Property Group is a hard-working bunch and my thanks go out to them. They are always open to offers of help, so, even if you cannot give a regular commitment, 'one-off' contributions of your time and talents would be gratefully received. Please approach David Johnson at SWB and Jim Brown at Inverkip if you have an inclination or ideas in this vein to discuss further.

A small donation is made per kilo, and over the past year, the accumulated total was 1827 kgs with a projected donation of £182 which will be used to replace litter picking equipment.
